Recap on The Green Initiative Fund

- Provide funds to UC Davis students, faculty, and staff to develop and lead projects to enhance campus sustainability measures. Projects must have undergraduate involvement and/or benefits.
- Quarterly student fee established by a Winter Quarter 2016 Student Referendum
 - ❖ \$3 undergrad fees started collecting Fall 2016
 - Grant cycles started Fall 2017
- Committee members voting: 9 students, 1 staff, 1 faculty; non-voting, ex-officio: 1 COSAF, 1 ASUCD-EPPC, 2 Office of Sustainability

- Increased student and faculty involvement on committee by adding ex-officio student members from COSAF and ASUCD EPPC and a faculty member
- Made further improvements to processes and applications using information learned from second year of giving out grants
- Used new subcommittee model to delegate and track committee work
- Innovated outreach methods during the pandemic response and sought partnerships for outreach

TGIF Grant Process


- \$200 to \$20,000

Cup and Cloth

Goals: Tackle menstrual waste and availability of eco-friendly menstrual products; address basic needs; normalize discussion of menstruation





- Peter Geoghan: "This to me is a great example of addressing multiple societal challenges in one project."
- Rachel Glover: "I absolutely love Cup and Cloth because not only does it provide education and sustainable menstruation products, but it didn't use binary language about gender and I believe it really has the power to de-stigmatize so much about period products and just having one in the first place."



Davis Freedges

- Goals: Reduce food waste; get food to hungry students
- Committee Quotes:
 - Lili Jeske: "This project stands out to me because its a continuation of an already established project, but it's a great example of improving a project to benefit a wider UC Davis community and expanding its sustainability mission."
 - Savan Khatkar: "I really like the Freedge because it's pretty to admire at night as well as the fact that it gives equal access to our student population. It gives them access to fresh fruits and vegetables which all students deserve and brings attention to the issue of food security."



Davis Night Market

Goals: Avoid food waste; reduce food insecurity; build community; use bikes; have fun!

Committee Quotes:

- Elana Nager: "I think that this project really encompasses what it means to be sustainable on every level (eliminating food waste, minimizing carbon footprint by bike riding, and the use of compostable boxes). I also think that this project is really meaningful to the Davis community as a whole because it provides food that would otherwise go to waste to those who need it most."
- Lydia Kao: "I think [Davis Freedges and Davis Night Market] both solve two major problems (food insecurity and food waste) in their own ways, and promote the sense of collective action and community as well."
- Jules Mouat: "I appreciate that this project redistributes food, instead of creating new food or products. ...I think a major focus of environmentalism should be the redistribution of food and products that already exist."





Climate Reality Project

- Goals: Educate and engage around climate action; empower discussions
- Committee Quotes:
 - Elana Nager: "This project is special to me because it was an example of the UC Davis chapter participating in a global event that truly shows how the climate crisis is affecting everyone on a personal level. ... This project was inspiring in its mission to educate and provoke action in everyone and I am so happy that TGIF was able to facilitate this event on campus."
 - Lili Jeske: "This was a great example of a well thought out proposal. I also like that it's a great example of an event rather than research or something that is ongoing, as it's a great reminder to people who may be thinking of applying to host an event."









Hyperloop

Goals: Project-based learning; transform transportation

Committee Quotes:

Peter Geoghan: "I was really impressed with the way students are learning engineering skills ... to work for a rapid shift towards a reduction in fossil fuel dependency, improved public transportation infrastructure, and efficiency of human travel. It was a really big deal that the team qualified and competed in the SpaceX competition last summer, where top engineering teams from around the world were featured. They represented UCD and the Davis community and hopefully will take these skills with them beyond their studies and be a part of a rapid transformation for a more sustainable future...."



Arboretum Floating Island

Goals: Improve water quality; wildlife habitat and aesthetic appeal in the Arboretum Waterway near Putah Creek Lodge

Committee Quotes:

Megan Powers: "I thought this was a creative idea to tackle the water quality problem we were facing in the Arboretum. I think it is a great example of how students are focusing their time at UC Davis to solving local environmental issues!"
